**President’s Report**



**Dear Friends,**

As ever adapting Zontians, we are planning to have a Quiz Afternoon on Sunday October 31. This will be held at the Northridge Scout Hall from 2pm. This will be a new location and time for us. It is a larger hall so Covid restrictions will be more easily accommodated. There is a flier later in the Zeal and we look forward to welcoming you for an afternoon of fun and brain teasing. Please invite friends and family to join us as we have not been able to have many fundraisers this year. To add additional value to this afternoon we are asking that you bring a new soft toy or

a blanket or shawl in good condition to donate towards packs of goodies put together for babies entering foster care.

Our District 23 Conference originally planned for Bendigo became a virtual conference via zoom. We were able to run a 3-day programme very close to what would have happened at Bendigo with guest speakers, a memorial service, a flag ceremony and candidate speeches. Voting by club delegates occurred online and ran very smoothly. There is more information about the conference later in the Zeal.

On Saturday 18 September I attended a workshop organised by the National Council of Women SA which focussed on homelessness and the growing cohort of women aged over 50 who now find themselves homeless. It was an interesting session with 6 speakers providing their perspective on the issue. There are no easy solutions but with the growing awareness there will hopefully be a greater focus on finding solutions.

We are planning library displays at The Parks Library at Angle Park and Tea Tree Gully and are finalising our sticker design and brochure outlining the origin of the 16 days of Activism. Our aim is that this period will promote increased knowledge of the importance of decreasing violence against women. We have been invited to work with Relationships Australia in Port Adelaide on a clothesline project and our preliminary discussion with them raised a number of possible connections.

Our Early Bird prize, the crocheted shawl was drawn at our September 7 meeting and the winner was ticket number 114, bought by Marina Dadd. The final draw will be at our December meeting on December 7, so you still have time to purchase tickets at \$5. Club members can supply you with tickets.



With a rapidly growing number of women living in poverty and experiencing homelessness the National Council of Women SA are bringing together key thinkers and action-takers in this space to discuss practical solutions.

Homelessness is a complicated issue with a complex cohort. Those experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity can have experienced family violence, mental health issues, exhausted their savings, faced job insecurity and includes those unable to work.

We have an ageing population, a high cost of housing, and a significant gap in wealth accumulation between men and women across their lifetimes. Without innovative solutions this problem will continue to increase.

With varying circumstances and a whole range of differences in assets, income and capacity to work, a range of solutions is needed to assist women to achieve housing security and sustain it through retirement.

This requires engagement across sectors to develop practical solutions—from property, finance and business, through to governments, community housing and philanthropy.

In this seminar we will determine the breadth of the issue in South Australia while quickly zooming into the practical solutions we can implement now to champion change.

## **Report by President Pam Fletcher**

On Saturday September 18th I attended the Homelessness workshop convened by the National Council of Women South Australia (NCWSA). Fiona Dorman, President of the NCWSA welcomed the participants and promised a variety of perspectives would be presented. There were 6 speakers from various groups and all acknowledged that women over 50 have become a disproportionate number of the homeless in SA.

Rohan Feegrade CEO of Lutheran Care nominated breakdown of marriage or relationships, low superannuation, increased costs of housing, increased costs of health services and domestic violence as factors causing these increased numbers. He said that that Lutheran Care was experiencing increased pressure on counselling, support services and housing. and suggested that the Federal Government should be taking the lead on dealing with homelessness. Lutheran Care are currently forming partnerships with corporate partners in an attempt to provide more housing.

Jane Mussared, CEO of COTA in SA said it is not possible to look at all older people as a 'job lot'. They are individuals with very different backgrounds and needs. However often older women who become homeless have generally worked hard, probably had a broken work life, now find it hard to find jobs and are often overlooked for promotion and employment. Many are often underemployed in comparison with men of similar ages. Women take on a disproportionate share of caring responsibilities within their own family as well as their parents.. this impacts on their Income, superannuation and home ownership. Females pushed into the private rental market face insecure tenure, limited access to community amenities and cannot afford market rents. More public housing is needed for women.

Dr Alice Clark, President of Shelter SA explained that her organisation is a registered charity and has no government funding and no housing. They play a role in research, advocacy and community engagement. She explained that anyone retiring with a mortgage is unlikely to be able to afford to pay it off and that Adelaide has the second worst Housing Affordability Index numbers. Public Housing has been provided by the government whereas Community Housing is provided by not for profits. Homeless numbers are increasing while public housing is reducing with about 20,000 on the waiting list. Even crisis accommodation is not available with about one third missing out. When people use the term affordable housing this is not what it is as often a deposit of \$40,000 or so is needed to qualify and many do not have access to this amount of money.

Her suggested solutions included increasing investment in social housing, using empty houses for cheap accommodation, a rental voucher scheme and encouraging residential owners to accept below market rents.

Emma Siami, Board Member of Uniting SA spoke of a vision of a comprehensive, respectful and just community in which all people participate and flourish. Uniting currently provide housing to about 1,000 people a year and can provide wrap around services. in particular their homelessness services provide support, advice, advocacy and housing and find that women over 50 are the fastest growing group in the homeless cohort.

Sarah Brennen, from Good Shepherd talked about their no interest loans for women affected by domestic and family violence. They can also help with counselling and crisis services. their no interest loans can be used to purchase essential items such as washing machines, car repairs, and school items and last year provided 26,500 loans which totalled \$28.9m. Loans can be spread over 18-24 months and can be paid weekly, fortnightly or monthly.

Brendan Rinaldi from ANZ also spoke about the problems of home ownership when housing prices are high and rising. He talked about lend lease communities where people may own property but not the land. This can work as it reduces the cost but also has some disadvantages.

Amethyst de Wilde spoke from personal experience about the realities of being homeless and how difficult it can be to adjust.

A stimulating morning with lots of information presented and ideas suggested. We all need to maintain pressure on governments to recognise the situation and take action.

## District Conference Report by President Pam Fletcher

Unfortunately we were denied the chance to travel to Bendigo and have a face to face conference but the organising committee worked tirelessly to provide much the same programme via zoom. For the most part ,it worked seamlessly and any hiccups were quickly resolved. In some states they gathered together to watch the conference while technology also allowed members the chance to link in from home.



District 23 Governor Sandra Burns oversaw the programme over the three days ably assisted by others at Mission Controls West and East. Sandra provided an overview of the history of District 23 finishing with the news that the Riverland club on November 7 had chartered a Z club.

Guest Speaker Sue Mills spoke about the role of women in the gold industry in Victoria starting with the little known fact that in 1852 , 2 women discovered gold.

Non Zontians were asked to leave before the AGM which included Candidate speeches for the leadership positions. All clubs had delegates representing them with no proxies. Each candidate spoke of their vision for our District and especially the clubs.

On Saturday, Jess Hill was our guest speaker. Jess is the author of 'See what you made me do 'and has collaborated on series shown on the ABC which are available on iView . For the last 7 years Jess Hill has been researching domestic abuse and speaks convincingly and persuasively about the need to take action now.

She highlighted the problems of identifying coercive control but said that most domestic abuse is in fact coercive control. Even though some states are considering legislating against it, if it is criminalised it would need to be accompanied by a lot of police training to enable them to both recognise it and deal with it. Isolation is often the first stage and can be subtle initially. Women find most aspects of their daily life controlled, from who they see and what they wear to in some cases being tracked through their mobile phone or having intimate photos shared. Jess suggested that there seems to be a consistent pattern of abuse which is typically followed. Because this is not physical, victims and their family and friends often fail to see it.



Many women stay as they believe they can help their abuser. Women and even children start to focus on how they can keep the man 'happy' by following the rules as they believe escape is impossible and possibly even dangerous. Without support they are very vulnerable.


Jess named a number of programmes which have made a difference; Justice Reinvestment, Tribunal Court. In each case the focus was on prevention and analysing the cause of any situation after analysing the data. We were all thoroughly impressed again with the clarity of Jess's presentation and her grasp of the problem and possible solutions.

During breaks, information about ZI and our district was shared via screenshots.



Natalie invited people to join One Million People and look to reduce overconsumption, household energy and food waste.

Gerry spoke about the value of working with others and suggested people should not be overwhelmed but join with others and do one thing which will make a difference.



Zonta International and District 23 Young Women In Public Affairs Recipient **Eloise Amirtherajah** was articulate and demonstrated a strong social conscience. Her nomination highlighted her many activities within her local community and one project she spoke about was the green wardrobe which asked participants to donate clothing and this then allowed them to obtain clothing from others using vouchers given for their donation. It was not designed to make money but to encourage sharing and reduce wastage.

Sunday, the last day of the conference, provided an opportunity to remember Zontians who are no longer with us and to recognise those with many years of service. Our own Aileen Eldridge was recognised for her 40 years of service in two clubs, Para District Area and Riverland.



Within the Service and Advocacy awards, we had nominated one of our editions of the Zeal within the Newsletter category of the awards and against strong competition were not successful but we remain very proud of our work, especially our editor Alexa Little.

**What to say when someone tells you about their sexual assault**

A close friend came to visit me about six months after I was violently raped. She remarked that I'd become withdrawn. She said, "Aren't you still going to ground. Eyes downcast. I told her: "After a few moments of silence, she asked: "Why? My heart began beating faster as she went on: "My stomach dropped—and I wished I could take my story..."

**Gender-based violence, including domestic violence, is mitigated and reduced**  
UN Women focuses on six areas in its response:  
• Prevention and awareness-raising  
• Access to essential services, including helplines and shelters  
• Violence against women's groups  
• Support to women's groups  
• UN Women is monitoring and/or undertaking rapid assessments of violence against women and girls and COVID-19 in many countries, including Bosnia and Herzegovina, Egypt, Fiji, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Malawi, Morocco, Palestine, South Africa, Tonga, Tunisia and Vanuatu. The Safe and Fair programme in Asia Pacific reports increased risk of sexual exploitation and violence by police and armed forces at border controls, and heightened risk of psychological violence to women who lost their jobs and are no longer able to support their families.



In the last panel session Lesley Sweetman spoke with Mary Crooks from the Victorian Womens Trust . Mary outlined her PAP screening acronym

**Purposeful**– what are you asking for? Have a clear aim

**Authentic**—you are what you are and are not all things to all people

**People Centred**– interested in the common good. Leave ego aside

**Strategic entry**– careful and strategic. Cannot do everything

**Clarity**– in own communication and in collaboration

**Reality**– own reality, be constructive. Need to understand the social reality

**Effectiveness** -striving for outcomes

**Energy**– do the hard yards. It is not easy

**Negotiate issues and outcomes** -May need to concede some ground but still have some non negotiables

**Integrity in bucketfuls** -Own integrity. Stand up for what you believe.

**Nouse**– trusting, intuitive understanding of this. May need to handball to someone better placed to deal with it.

**Guts** -courage of conviction. Keep on keeping on

Mary suggested that women consider the matters that count in the coming Federal election and ask candidates to pledge to be focussed on the issues that are important to women.

When we have raised sufficient for the minimum 200 kits, we will contact those who have donated and are interested to our assembly day inviting them to participate. We think that this would be one way people could see a direct value in their donation and we could spread the word about birthing kits.
